

During the fiscal year 2021–2022, The Cornwall Library augmented its programs and activities to provide information, entertainment, and support to our community. We expanded our downloadable collection, our programming, and added significant children's programming. Our new technical capabilities are available to all town groups.

Collection: The Cornwall Library's collection remains robust, at 29,000 volumes plus thousands of downloadable eBooks and audiobooks through Overdrive. We have three ways to request books through interlibrary loan so virtually any book in a Connecticut library is available to Cornwall Library patrons. We are researching new options for our downloadable collection that will offer more choices to patrons and allow the Cornwall Library to build its own collection of e-books and downloadable audiobooks.

Technology: We have enhanced our technical resources. We extended the reach of our Wi-Fi outside of the building, opening it to the public. The Town of Cornwall Economic Development Commission has installed equipment that extends our Wi-Fi even farther, well onto the green. In addition, the town, through an American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARPA) grant, has awarded the Library funding for a hybrid live/Zoom room which will be available to all town groups.

Circulation: Circulation is slowly returning to pre-pandemic levels. We are on track for a 31% increase over 2020-2021 but we remain below pre-pandemic levels .

New Patrons: We added 87 new patrons in the past year.

Programs: The Library's programming has been consistently original and of high quality. We continued our very successful Zoom programming along with live and hybrid events.

reward, a Goldilocks event, and a visit with Debby Labbe's llamas; a weekly toddler group; a Thursday afterschool art group; and camp afternoons for children.

We have presented 4 events focused on nature, 7 focused on local events/concerns; 2 events on national concerns, and 2 animal events, one on puppies and one on turtles.

The Library offered 4 series of art classes and one 8-week course on Middlemarch.

In addition, the Library is once again the site for a monthly knitting group and weekly exercise classes.

We held 3 major fundraisers, the Labor Day Art Sale, the Under the Tent Book Sale, and Books and Blooms.

Finances: The Library's finances are always carefully monitored and are strong. Along with expanded services comes an expanded budget. The annual town appropriation supplies about 25% of our funding. We depend on contributions for the remaining 75%.

In short the Library is doing very well. We enhanced our involvement in Cornwall by expanding and enhancing our collection and our programming, especially children's programming. We are grateful for our wonderful community, our staff, and the many people who volunteer their time to help run the library and its programs.



Fiscal Year July 1, 2021 to June 30, 2022

The Library's major sources of revenue for fiscal year 2021-2022 were the annual appeal, the Town grant, and two major fundraising events, Books and Blooms, and the Labor Day Benefit Art Sale. The Library's programs generated a new and significant source of contributions. We received a large memorial gift in honor of Marvin L. Johnson, and two ARPA grants, one directly from the Town of Cornwall and one through the Connecticut State Library.

Some of these funds were transferred into the Library's endowment. The ARPA funds were used to expand the Library's Wi-Fi, to install touch-free bathroom fixtures, and to purchase outdoor furniture along with other Library improvements.
